

The Divine and Human Natures of Jesus

In relation to the glory and beauty of the Person of the Saviour there are two inseparable truths, calling for our profoundest adoration. First of all, we must consider the greatness of the Saviour. He is the second Person of the Holy Trinity. He is God over all, blessed for ever. He is the King of Kings and the Lord of Lords. Jesus, the One who saves from sin, is God! He is divine! All the fullness of God dwells in Him!

What a world of comfort lies in this very truth for a sinner who has discovered the true nature of his sin! Apart from this divine Saviour sin is an incurable disease. The power of the Son of God is required to free from this sore bondage. How great is He, how great is His salvation!

When we meditate on the Person of the Saviour we should never neglect His greatness. He is divine. Another truth concerning His Person, of equal importance, is His condescension. He assumed our nature. He was born of the Virgin Mary and laid in the lowly manger of Bethlehem. Neither His greatness nor His condescension can ever be fully measured.

There is a corresponding relationship between the two. He stoops so lowly, He condescends to the depth of our misery. He stoops to the lowest hell of our depravity. Marvel at so great a condescension. Our Creator became a creature, and thus fully qualified to save from sin. He is the only Saviour from sin; every sinner needs Him!

A Sincere Prayer:

"And the publican, standing afar off, would not lift up so much as his eyes unto heaven, but smote upon his breasts saying, God be merciful to me a sinner." Read Luke 18:1-14



A Pastoral Message

The Publican's prayer was very brief, but no man ever came to God in prayer with a more needed petition. The Publican was not just saying mere words. He meant what he said. The prayer came right from his heart. He realized he was a lost and perishing sinner. His desire for mercy was in earnest. He confessed to be a sinner, or the sinner, as the Greek has it.

If we rightly understand the meaning of the Ten Commandments, we shall also earnestly pray, "God be merciful to me a sinner."

A person who truly knows his own heart will never say, I am not a great sinner. Many comfort themselves with the idea that they have not sinned as much as others. However, this is foolish and dishonest. We should never compare ourselves to others.

The important question is, have we kept the Law of God perfectly, or have we broken it? If we have broken the holy Law of God (and who has not?) we are sinners and are subject to the just wrath of our Maker. How can we escape this wrath of God without divine mercy?

The Publican's prayer was directed to the God whom he had offended. Where else can a guilty sinner go for relief? The Lord is the only Refuge. We have offended Him by our sins. Yet He is compassionate and merciful and willing to forgive. How necessary it is for guilty, helpless sinners, to fly to God, who is, for Christ's sake, able to save us from our sins.

The publican is a beggar at the Throne of Grace. He pleads and begs for mercy. Mercy is divine pity and compassion to those who are in misery on account of their sins. To pray this prayer is not the same as just repeating good and solemn words without feeling. No, it is coming with the same burden as the Publican, with earnest desires and prayers pleading for this precious and indispensable blessing.

Notice, he asks for mercy. He does not speak a word about his own goodness. The Publican finds nothing in himself that he can plead. His heart's desire is divine mercy.

The petition, be merciful, is richer in meaning than is often understood. The believing Israelites in Jesus' day would go to the temple at the time of the morning and evening sacrifices. The expression merciful is related to these sacrifices, to the atonement made by blood. These sacrifices pointed to Christ. So the penitent Israelites prayed that by virtue of the atonement of Christ they might be forgiven.

The Publican's prayer meant, "Let me be reconciled to God by the blood of Christ." Many people do not pray. Why? They do not feel the need of mercy. A sincere desire for mercy brings a man on his knees.

My friends, do you pray for mercy? If not, how can you expect mercy? What must become of you without this precious grace? O, that you may begin to pray!
