Bible Course Acts to Revelation

Lesson 72

Read Revelation 2:18-29

The longest letter of the seven is written to the least known church of Thyatira which was 20-40 miles SE of Pergamos. The city had approximately 25,000 people. Thyatira did have a trading center with mandatory trade guilds (bakers, cobblers, tanners). Each guild had a god to which food was offered and immoral acts occurred at the gatherings. Lydia was a member of the small Christian church in this area.

Read Revelation 3:1-6

Sardis was a major center for trade and traffic, surrounded by mountains, seemingly impregnable, but later captured and conquered two times. Then, after some time, Sardis was destroyed

by an earthquake. When John wrote these words, Sardis was recuperating and rebuilding and also again becoming over self-confident. This spirit of self-confidence infiltrated the Christian church. We don't read anything about false doctrine. This church had a reputation of being alive and thriving, but Jesus said the church was dead.
