Christ's Ascension and His Sitting at the Right Hand of God the Father

Read: Luke 24:49-53; Acts 1:1-11; Mark 16:19; Acts 7:54-56; Ephesians 1:20-23

I. Christ's Ascension

It was forty days since Jesus rose from the dead. He often appeared to His followers since then. Thus there was clear proof of His resurrection. At last the time had come for Jesus to leave this earth and to return to His Father in heaven.

The final appearance of Jesus to His disciples was in Jerusalem. They walked together to the Mount of Olives. There Jesus told the disciples to wait in Jerusalem for the coming of the Holy Spirit.

Likewise, Jesus further instructed His disciples, giving them the great commission, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost" (Matthew 28:19).

When Jesus had spoken His last message, He raised His hands to bless them. While they were watching, they saw Him rise from the ground. He rose higher and higher. Finally a cloud hid Him from their view.

The ascension of Christ was a majestic event. His reception into heaven was, like His resurrection, an indication that His sufferings in place of His people were fully accepted by the Father.

Being ascended and seated at the right hand of God the Father, Christ continues to minister to His people, to the Church bought by His precious blood.

While Christ was on earth, He actively displayed a gracious sensitivity to all manner of human need. Now He is no longer here below in His human nature. He ascended into heaven. Christ has received the honour promised by the Father. He is now seated at the right hand of God.

This means that He shares in the glory and dominion of God the Father. However, this exalted Christ has lost none of His love and concern for His Church here on earth. In heaven Christ cares for all who seek help from Him in time of need. On their behalf He pleads for their acceptance on the basis of His own merits.

Christ sits at the right hand of God as the Head of His Church. He rules her by His Word and Spirit. In this way He bestows on the members of His Church the heavenly graces necessary for their salvation and comfort. The exalted Christ blesses sinners with the special grace of repentance. See Acts 5:31

The power of this enemy is strong, but Christ is far stronger. He is able to protect His own dear children from enemies without and within. Christ will never let His children perish. He is their Shield and great Defender.

How blessed are all who may hide under the shadow of His wings!

III. His Present Activity

Christ's earthly ministry was of inexpressibly great value and so is His heavenly ministry. What a great comfort did He bring while He was on earth to those who came to Him with the burden of their sin and sorrow!

Now, being ascended, He still helps the needy in their various distresses. He prays for His Church, for all those who sincerely believe in Him. He still speaks, by His Word and Spirit, of peace and pardon to those who are troubled on account of their sinful and lost condition.

What a heavenly comfort can He bring when all seems lost from man's side, when the needy sinner sees no longer a way out. The peace He gives to the sinner, who sees himself as lost, is the best balm the human heart can ever know.

What can compare to Christ Himself, coming by His Word and Spirit, making it known to a lost sinner that He remembers him in love and mercy and prays for him as the great High Priest who prays for all His own.

In Ephesians 1:22 we read that Christ is "the head over all things to the church." God also had the Church in mind when He raised Him (Ephesians 20-22). The exaltation of Christ is not only an honour placed upon Jesus but also a direct benefit for the Church.

A Pastoral Message
Christ's heavenly ministry is of great importance for the true believer today. Christ never fails to love His own. He remembers them continuously. To know by faith that He cares for us is a blessed comfort especially when we are in distress.
When the Holy Spirit convinces us of our sinful and lost condition the most precious comfort is experience when Christ, by His Word and Spirit, makes it known to us that He pleads our case with the Father. How blessed are those who know this heavenly love!
Someone may say, "I can believe that Christ comforts His children, but alas I know nothing of these great mercies in my own experience. Oh I wished that Christ would also do something for me." The encouraging answer is He can help you too. He can teach you to pray for that grace that He gives to His own people.
When a sinner begins to pray to God from the heart, that is a fruit of Christ's work. Christ can soften the hardest heart and cause it to pray. He is fully qualified to do this. Think of what happened on the day of Pentecost. How full of enmity were the Jews against Jesus; they crucified Him.
However, when Christ sent His Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost three thousand sinners came to repentance and prayed for the first time. What He did for these three thousand, He has often repeated since.
Would He not be able to do it for you? Ask and it shall be given you. Seek and ye shall find. Knock and it shall be opened unto you. Be sure to persevere!
