James

The General Epistle of James was written by "James, a servant of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ." There are four men with the name of James in the New Testament. James, a son of Zebedee and brother of John, was killed shortly after Jesus' resurrection; therefore, he is not considered to be the author of this book. James, the son of Alphaeus, at times called "James the less," was one of the disciples, but otherwise is unknown. It is doubtful that he is the author. James, the father of Judas [not Iscariot], is mentioned as the father of one of the twelve disciples, but otherwise is unknown. He is not thought to be the author. Most of the expositors of Scripture point to James, the Lord's brother and one of the "pillars" of the church in Jerusalem [Acts 15], as the probable author of this book. James addressed this book to the "twelve tribes," meaning the early Christians that were "scattered abroad," likely living in Gentile communities outside of Palestine. This book, or letter, was written in approximately 49 A.D., prior to the Jerusalem Council held in 50 A.D. The purpose of this letter is to emphasize the necessity of works to prove a person's faith to be genuine. James also wishes to teach right Christian behavior, expose hypocritical positions, and encourage Christians as they face trials and persecution.

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Meditation:

Every one that gets to the throne must put his foot upon the thorn. The way to the crown is by the cross. We must taste the gall, if we are to taste the glory. If justified by faith, we must suffer tribulations also. When God brought Israel through the Red Sea, He led them into the wilderness; so when God saves a soul He tries it. He never gives faith without trying it. The way to Zion is through the valley of Baca. You must go through the wilderness of Jordan, if you are to come to the Land of Promise. Some believers are much surprised when they are called to suffer. They thought they would do some great thing for God; but all that God permits them to do is to suffer. Go round to everyone in glory; everyone has a different story, yet everyone has a tale of suffering. One was persecuted by his family, by his friends and companions; another was visited by sore pains and humbling disease, or neglected by the world; another was bereaved of children; another had all these afflictions meeting in one – deep called unto deep. But mark, all are brought out of them. It was a dark cloud, but it passed away; the water was deep, but they have reached the other side. Not one of them blames God for the road He led them; "Salvation" is their only cry. Is there any one of you, dear children of God, murmuring at your lot? Do not sin against God. This is the way God leads all His redeemed ones. You must have a palm as well as a white robe. No pain, no palm; no cross, no crown; no thorn, no throne; no gall, no glory. Learn to glory in tribulations also. "I reckon that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory that shall be revealed in us."
