#### **Meditation: The Lord Shall Preserve Thee From All Evil**

The well-known writer of "The Pilgrim's Progress," John Bunyan, was shut up for twelve years in prison for the truth's sake. During the last years of his imprisonment there was a jailer who favoured Bunyan very much. He favoured him so much that once in a while he allowed him to go home, if he only took care to be back again on time in the morning. For a long time that went very well. But finally the enemies heard some rumours about this, and were waiting for an occasion to catch him. On a certain evening the jailer permitted him to go home again on the usual conditions. Bunyan sat in his home and talked with his wife, but finally they went to bed.

It was, however, impossible for him to get to sleep that evening. He was afraid and agitated, without really knowing the cause of his uneasiness. Finally he woke his wife a little after midnight, and told her about his anxiety, and decided to return to the prison. He announced himself at the gate, and the jailer grumbled some because he was disturbed in his sleep.

Hardly an hour later someone else knocked, and when the jailer opened the door, there stood some police officers of the sheriff in London, who asked whether all the prisoners were present. On the affirmative answer, they asked, "Bunyan, too?" They had to see him before they were satisfied. Then they left. The danger was averted. Bunyan thanked the Lord, Who showed so clearly that He watched over His child.

Bunyan received more tokens of this in his life. Once he was almost drowned in a seawinding in which he was swimming. He was saved in the nick of time.

Another time he tumbled into a deep pit out of which they could save him, but with the greatest trouble. It also happened that he tried to kill a snake with a stick, and that he was wounded by the poisonous fangs of the animal.

These deliverances happened before he came to conversion. The Lord was going to use him for something else. Therefore Bunyan could not die. He had to accomplish a great task in the Kingdom of God.

Readers, you have perhaps also had some of those wonderful deliverances in your life. What has it worked out for you? May we in earnest ask ourselves this important question. How terrible shall it be to harden ourselves under all those mercies, to go our own way with death before us?

That this all may drive us out to the throne of grace to experience the greatest wonder, namely, to be brought from darkness to God's wonderful light.
