A Pastoral Message

Prayer proceeds from a high view of God. The God to whom we pray is majestic and great. In His marvellous condescending mercy, He has provided a place of refuge, a Throne of Grace. To this wondrous throne He welcomes the poor and the needy, the helpless and the oppressed, the lonely and the wretched, the vile and the guilty.

No case is too desperate for the One who sits on this Throne. His mercy is higher than the very heavens. Christ, the crucified and risen Redeemer, is the new and living way of approach to the Throne of Grace. Guilty sinners should approach God only through the blood of God's dear Son.

God, the Holy Spirit is the secret of all true prayer. He instils the desire in the heart. He convinces the sinner of his deep need. He discloses to the heart and mind the wonder of God's mercy in Christ. God only hears and answers prayer for Christ's sake and the Holy Spirit teaches to pray from the heart.

In order to pray aright, we must pray for light to discover and know our true state and condition before God, so that we may humbly plead with Him for mercy. We need such light as only the Holy Spirit can provide.

Therefore, strange as it may appear, we must pray before we begin to pray.

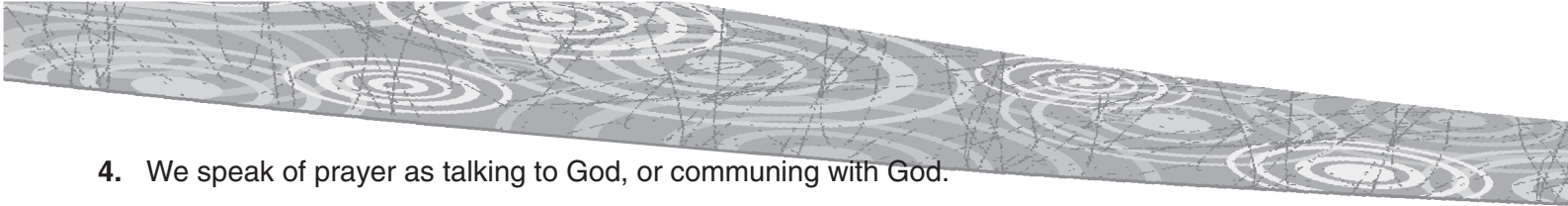
- A. * Prayer is the humble expression of our sincere desires and is directed to God who hears and answers only for Christ's sake.

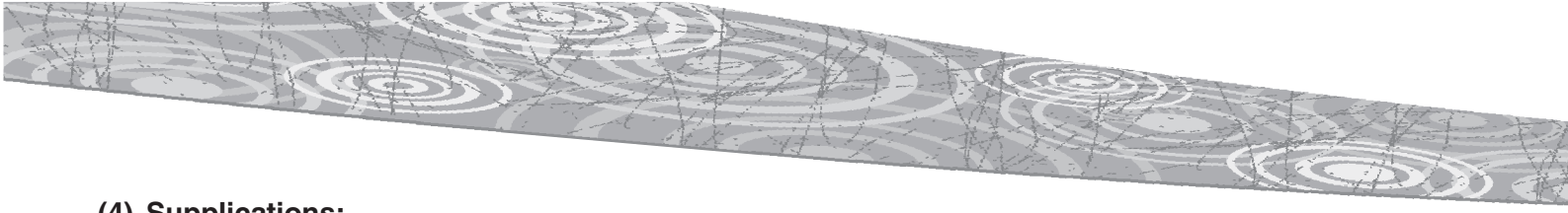
